#### Vehicle-Related Matters

Unfortunately, I have received further emails of complaint from residents living in Chestwood Close. Last week, there was literally chaos around the section of Perry Street/ Chestwood Close between Newlands Road and Hillhouse Drive. Unfortunately, it is the same people every day who park/leave their cars directly opposite or on the junction of Chestwood Close and directly on the junction of Newlands

Road. The Highway Code says DO NOT stop or park opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction. In the past, I have had to stand in the middle of the road and direct traffic in this area as the problem has been so bad - I am no longer willing to do this as I see my place to be at the school gates. If you are one of the parents who I am referring to in this email, please be aware that you are putting lives at risk by simply not being prepared to park a little further away - or - perhaps even walk?

I am sure you can see how frustrated by this I am - I receive regular emails of complaint from residents - some vociferous in nature - and it takes up my time responding to them and trying to resolve issues which are out of my control.

#### **After-School Collection**

We have lots of measures in place to ensure children are collected safely after school but, from time to time, a parent might be delayed or a child might forget that they should be attending a club. We regularly remind children to go back to one of the adults on duty if they are unable to see who usually collects them - we then take them to the office and make calls etc as required. Recently, there have been occasions when other parents, wanting to be of assistance, have intervened, and contacted the parent directly or 'scooped' the child up within their own family group. Please can we ask you to assist us by reminding children to go back to the teachers on duty - this is far more helpful than any other measure. Thank you.
